

Text-based Intervention Grammar (Verbs)

Verbs

Present Progressive

In present progressive the action is not complete, but ongoing.

John **is flying** a kite
The boy **is swimming**

My friends **are riding** their bikes
Sally and Kate **are playing** together

Present Tense

The action is completed now.
We add an /s/ to the end of the verb (**action word**).

A man **shaves**
An artist **paints**

Karen **watches** television
Mum **washes** the clothes

Future Tense

The action will be completed some time in the future.

Kerry **will wash** the dishes
We **will fly** to Mars one day

Lyn **will have seen** me play
I **shall have fun** tomorrow

Perfect Tense

The action is in the present and has been completed **now**.

James **has poured** a drink
Peter **has written** a story

Michelle and Dianne **have baked** a cake
The girls **have ordered** two milkshakes

Past Tense

In the past tense the action was completed some time in the past.

Regular Past Tense (-ed)
I **waited** at the bus station
We **planted** the trees

Irregular Past Tense (spelling changes)
I **slept** in the bed last night
We **built** a new tree house

Noun-Verb Agreement

We use the word 'is' to tell what one person is doing, and use the word 'are' to describe what two or more people are doing

Correct
He **is** fishing
We **are** fishing

Incorrect
We **is** fishing
He **are** fishing
